Eccleshall Parish All Pull Together — Eccleshall Cares

A challenging time has been met head-on and with gusto by community-spirited Eccleshall parish residents this last few weeks, as a team of locals have set about ensuring that no vulnerable people are forced to leave their homes for necessities.

'Eccleshall Cares' - the brainchild of Joe Cheetham-Wilkinson - have so far brought together a team of over 140 amazing volunteers willing to give their time to shopping and delivering groceries, collecting prescriptions, and even just being on the end of the phone for a friendly chat. and records all service users and their needs, while keeping them safe with telephone payments and non-contact deliveries.

Thanks to the financial support of Holy Trinity PCC, local residents, the Rotary Club and a generous grant from Eccleshall Parish Council, Eccleshall Cares are also now able to offer completely free essential supplies to those who may be experiencing a challenging gap in income, so nobody in Eccleshall parish will be in need of essentials.

They have also been able to set up a brand-new helpline for those who aren't online, or who just want to hear a real human voice, on 07534 914629.

Chebsey, Leaving No One without the Support they need

Chebsey Parish is like all others parishes struggling to comprehend the magnitude of the current epidemic sweeping the world.

However, even during these difficult times, we are doing everything we can to support all parishioners and have over the last week made contact with every household in the parish offering our support.

Many acts of kindness are taking place, local residents are offering help to those who are self-isolating and vulnerable, including collecting prescriptions, purchasing shopping, general support and even an offer of dog walking.



We have arranged weekly 'drop-offs' of fresh fruit and vegetables, facilitated increased 'door-step' milk deliveries and made arrangements for Perry's of Eccleshall to deliver goods once a week.

Individuals who have on-line orders with spare capacity are also being asked to include neighbours food requirements with theirs.

Many residents joined in the nation's 'clap for NHS workers' and we have parishioners who are busy sewing masks and scrubs for Stafford and Stoke NHS Hospitals.

Over the last few days a local person has been busy baking fruit cake for distribution to those self-isolating and / or vulnerable, this is being dropped off at the same time as their shopping and prescriptions. We've even used individuals daily walk time to litter pick around the parish!

Individuals have also volunteered to help Eccleshall Cares.

So, as a community we are doing our bit to help others during these difficult times, whilst at the same time trying to remain safe

As I write these notes we are in the midst of the Government imposed lockdown to counter the Covid-19 crisis. This afternoon, during the Government's Coronavirus Crisis briefing, Michael Gove MP urged us to stay at home and not to visit the countryside.

However, there has been an invasion of the countryside since the lockdown was announced and complaints have been received from farmers and their staff in Seighford Parish that they feel vulnerable because of the large increase in the numbers of walkers using footpaths and bridleways running through their land who are not taking sanitising precautions at gateways.

My farming relatives in Shropshire have told me that the same thing is happening there.

New Stafford Borough Local Plan 2020-2040: Issues and

Options Consultation



This consultation remains open until noon on Tuesday 21st April 2020

Stafford Borough Council has a statutory requirement to determine most planning applications against an agreed set of criteria for the area (- The Local Plan).

There is also a requirement to review this Local Plan, which has as it's base central government's Policy Framework (NPPF), once every five years.

This five year review is happening now for Stafford Borough. And it is quite a

significant review as many of the original framework policies have changed subtly since the original NPPF was introduced in March 2012.

This latest current consultation, which goes on until noon on Tuesday 21st April 2020 is asking for views on the Local Plan policies—these will help create the framework for what land is developed for residential as well as commercial use www.staffordbc.gov.uk/forward-planning-consultations

HS2 Parish Councils Petition the House of Lords

Stone Railhead Crisis Group was formed in November 2016 to oppose the HS2 proposals to build a construction railhead and permanent maintenance depot on a 2.9km long site between Walton, Yarnfield and Cold Norton. In January 2017, SRCG's technical team of experts identified a far more suitable location to build the facility near Keele Services and have campaigned tirelessly ever since for this alternative to be adopted.

SRCG's case is compelling on engineering, environmental and economic grounds and would save the taxpayer over £70 million in construction costs alone. It would also remove the need for separate railhead and maintenance facilities at Ashley near Manchester airport, which are likely to cost in excess of £150 million. Unfortunately, HS2 has been unwilling to change its plans, despite the obvious benefits of the alternative scheme.

After giving evidence on behalf of local parish councils on three occasions to the House of Commons Select Committee, SRCG's witnesses were preparing to do likewise for Stone Town Council and Yarnfield & Cold Meece and Chebsey Parish Councils in the House of Lords on 31th March. However, this appearance has now been delayed indefinitely because of the Covid-19 outbreak.

On the 11th February the Prime Minister confirmed that the HS2 project would be given the green signal, subject to the agreement of the budget and updated business case. Whilst on the face of it this means HS2 will go-ahead, a lot has happened in the last two months to suggest that a pause and a

rethink is required.

With the country in lockdown and millions of commuters and business travellers working from home and discovering that they can operate effectively and hold meetings remotely, it seems inevitable that this will lead to a longer-term change in travelling behaviours. Accordingly, HS2's already very weak business case is likely to collapse altogether.

If we factor in the run-away costs of HS2, which already exceed £128 billion, and the Chancellor's proactive measures to support the UK economy over the coming months, we must conclude that the project is not a national priority and has no justification to proceed.

I therefore join our MP, Sir Bill Cash, in calling for the project to be scrapped immediately before any more precious ancient woodlands and environmentally sensitive habitats are destroyed.

Doing Our Bit as Communities Help Communities

Lots of people are focused on doing their bit to support everyone in their own communities—the schemes and details are all different, reflecting the richness of our communities and their individuality. This effort does more than supplement the work that the professionals - in health and social care for example—have been doing, in that it helps keep people safe and out of greater support, to prevent the NHS from being overwhelmed.

People have been extremely innovative in their use of technology—for example hosting online quizzes through to undertaking virtual school trips or virtual dinner parties to keep people's spirits up and enthusiasm going.
