Staffordshire Women's Aid's birthday celebrations

Staffordshire Women's Aid started with their first flat above a butcher's shop in the Highfields in Stafford back in 1976.

The work that they do in supporting the victims of domestic violence was recognised in 2017 by Her Majesty The Queen, with the awarding of the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service.

So it was great to organise part of their 45th birthday celebrations back at the end of November 2021 at the London House Indian Restaurant in Eccleshall and raise £1,000 at the same time. Thank you to all those who supported the event in so many different ways.



Another part of the celebrations was the visit of national charity, Women Aid's, Chief Executive Farah Nazeer, and local MP, Theo Clarke, to Stafford—to see the most modern domestic violence refuge in the UK, which opened in 2016.

This was followed up by attending the Parliamentary launch of "16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence" in Westminster in December.

Raising awareness and creating greater holistic support for the victims of domestic violence remains a key area, whilst creating appropriate role models and safe spaces for those affected.



Congratulations to Eccleshall's Shortlisted Businesses

Period Power Wins Community Action Award

Eccleshall based Charity's selfless actions Recognised

Eleven groups were shortlisted in the Borough Council's Community Awards—Community Action category—this year with all thoroughly worthy of winning. But at the end of the day the panel of judges could only choose one winner and this year it was local Eccleshall based charity, Period Power.

The charity was set up to ensure that women and young girls are given the dignity of meeting their personal hygiene needs during menstruation, regardless of whether they can afford basic hygiene products that they need or not.

The charity has grown significantly through the commitments of their volunteers and from donations from local communities and is led by Linda Allbutt.

Period Power delivers sanitary products and other toiletries to food banks, domestic abuse refuges, schools and other charities across the county and has played a vital part in raising the awareness of this issue.

The Royal British Legion was founded in May 1921 and a branch started up in Stafford not long after that in July of the same year.

Therefore it was an enormous privilege to be at the ceremony to award the Royal British Legion Stafford Branch the freedom of the Borough, as they marked their hundredth year of providing financial, social and emotional support to members and veterans of the British Armed Forces, their families and dependants.

The council has the power to confer honorary 'Freedom' to people or organisations that have given eminent services to the borough, which they most definitely have. Many congratulations.

Special Recognition for Financially Supporting Communities

£2.5m of grant support used to support voluntary effort

There are many charities and organisations that work tirelessly in the voluntary sector who go unseen by many, but nevertheless their role is vital to ensure the vibrancy of the efforts that go on.

The Community Foundation for Staffordshire is one of those organisations, as a key partner to the local voluntary sector. The Foundation gives out grants, coming in the main from the return on their endowment fund investments, making them a sustainable funder.

But with the onset of the pandemic, they were recognised by government as a way of getting funding into voluntary sector organisations quickly to keep them afloat and supporting some of the most vulnerable in society. During the first three lockdowns, they gave out £2.5m of funding that kept the voluntary effort going and this was

recognised at the Borough Council's Community Awards with a Special Recognition award for all their endeavours.

They also accept legacies and donations in people's wills to support the local area in a sustainable way.

COVID Vaccinations Team Secure Judges Award

Nothing better depicts the voluntary sector in Stafford than the Vaccination Programme

Unsung heroes across the community of Stafford Borough were the big winners at the Borough Council's annual Community Awards ceremony in November.

The Awards—now in their fifth year—attracted an audience of over 150 people attending in person to see the thirty or more shortlisted individuals, organisations and businesses from across the Borough whittled down to those winning awards on the night. But as ever, everyone nominated really deserved an award, as well as our wholehearted thanks and praise.

The categories included Community Action, Environmental Improvement, Social Wellbeing and Local Hero – as well as an award to recognise sporting achievements in the borough.

This year the judges also awarded a special recognition award, which went to the COVID Vaccination Centre at the Staffordshire Showground, which had worked tirelessly to vaccinate over 95,000 people between starting in December 2020 and June 2021. The team then went on to run the Kingston Vaccination Centre. These endeavours—and those of the other vaccination centres in Staffordshire—were

recognised by the Special Recognition Award, which received a well deserved rousing standing ovation from everyone attending.

Staffordshire's Vaccination Programme steps up again

With the advent of the Omicron variant NHS & Social Care Rise to the Challenge

Sooner or later within the pandemic we were going to get a variant that spreads very fast. In the earlier waves of COVID there was a concern that that would be the Delta variant, but the Omicron strain has demonstrated the theory as, in the UK, it doubles every 2 or 3 days.

The 'booster jab' was already available to anyone over the age of fifty or more vulnerable to catching things, but with the news that that would be extended to anyone over the age of 18 and that anyone wanting a jab would be able to have one by the end of the year, if eligible, this has meant that vaccination centres in Stafford Borough have had to step up more than a few gears, just at a time when people want to spend time with their friends and families, after what has been a gruelling two years.

The clinical lead for the Vaccination Programme on Monday 15th December confirmed to the County's Health committee though that there would be sufficient supply of vaccine to help vaccinate 359,000 Staffordshire residents before the New Year.

Stafford Derelict House to provide a New Home for Family

Bringing back unused properties into providing new homes reduces development burden

Empty properties often become the blight of local communities and without the care and love and attention that they need on an ongoing basis, soon fall into a cycle of growing disrepair and soon become unlivable.

Never is this more so the case with an empty property that has taken two years of constant work to compulsorily purchase in Stafford, which has been empty for the last thirteen years and despite significant work to trace a next of kin there was none found.

So the only way forward was for the Borough to step in a buy the property, and settle all the outstanding debts by selling the property on at public auction. This will allow a new family to take ownership of the property and lovingly bring it back into a habitable standard over the next eighteen months.

These actions are always taken as a last resort as instead the Borough would prefer to work

with property owners to bring their properties back into use, but when all else fails, the Borough has to use the only remaining powers available to it.

Road Improvements Finally to Start at Beaconside & Redhills

After a delay of over four years, the works to dual the A513 Beaconside road are planned to start from April 2022 in the Marston Gate area, although some of the work can be undertaken off carriageway to limit the impact.

The works on the A34 in the Redhills area to put in a new roundabout and highways accesses will start early in the New Year to keep the length of the works and disruption to a minimum.

Community Grants given to groups across the Borough

Borough milestone of support to local groups nears

On a snowy Saturday at the end of November, nine local organisations shared £7,750, presented to them by the Mayor of Stafford, Councillor Tony Nixon.

The groups were as diverse as could be imagined, from those helping people recovering from addictions, through to a Scout and Guide band. And were principally from Stone and Stafford.

Locally, Chebsey Parish Hall received a grant of £1,000 to help upgrade their facilities, including a vital electrical upgrade.

These grants provide an important lifeline to many groups to help them expand support or become financially viable.

of Parliament for Stafford from 2010 through to 2019.

It took us three years to start the Walk, which we managed to complete over eight days, principally in the Summer, but finishing on one very wet day in early October.



As part of the

launch of doorstep walks in the Borough, we also invited anyone who wanted to join us to do so. Some of the days we had full days with just the three of us, but also days, especially around Stafford, where we had ten or more walkers out. Some came for an hour and others for the day and decided to come back again too.

It was a really useful reminder of how beautiful not only Stafford Borough, but the whole of Staffordshire is. So varied and under -appreciated.

The walk raised a total of £2,500 for the Stafford charity supporting the local area—Stafford Together.

Stafford Western Access Route opens for Traffic

Investing in infrastructure allows the local economy to benefit

The new link road from A34 Foregate Street at Madford Retail Park in Stafford to the A518 Newport Road Castlefields in Stafford opened in November 2021, following nearly two and a half years of construction and a cost of £63m.

The link aims to boost growth in the Borough and ease congestion in the centre of town, whilst also improve provision for bus services, pedestrians and cyclists.

There will also be environmental benefits through the re-development of areas of derelict land and landscaping along the route.
